What high school courses should I take?

- **Course Requirements – Concurrent**

- Varies by degree combination
- 80% for Math and science concurrent programs
- 75% for other concurrent programs
- Grade 12 U English is required for all programs

- **Requirements – Consecutive**

- Undergraduate degree
- PJ division: generalist
- IS division: Specialist with two teachables



Why might I want to pursue a degree in Education?

- Contribute to fostering the conditions in which children, youth, and life-long learners in diverse educational contexts thrive
- The skills you will develop through teacher education programs are highly transferrable to other careers
- Education graduates find job in a variety of career sectors
